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HOW TO USE THIS LANDSCAPE GUIDE

This edition of Gardening Simplified was written to help you spruce up your landscape, or design a whole new one, using our award winning shrubs. Instead of simply listing all of them A-Z, we've grouped them according to their landscape role — in other words, how and where they might be planted around your home and in your yard for maximum usefulness and visual impact.

HERE ARE SOME TIPS TO HELP YOU GET THE MOST FROM THIS BOOK AND GET STARTED ON A BETTER, MORE BEAUTIFUL LANDSCAPE:

- List the plants that you like best from each section, along with any notes about what you like about them, where you might plant them, etc. If you are a Pinterest user, make a board — you can pin your favorites directly from the Proven Winners website.
- 2. Check that your list of favorites offers a range of seasonal interest. The most compelling landscapes transition through the season, with plants that are at their peak whether with flowers, foliage, or form at different times. Consult the chart on page 90 to discover the season(s) of interest of the plants you like best.
- 3. Take a tip from professional designers print out several black and white copies of photos of your house. You may want to lighten the contrast, if necessary. Then sketch in the shapes of the plants you like to experiment with how they will actually play out in the landscape. You can draw in beds, vines, hedges, as well as individual plants this way.
- 4. Plant in multiples of odd numbers. Aside from specimen plants (p. 6-21), the other roles are most effective planted in multiples. Unless you are making a formal planting, such as on either side of an entryway, plan to plant multiples of odd numbers 3, 5, or 7 of the border plants, groundcovers, and hedges. Odd numbers are the easiest to arrange and the most visually appealing. To create continuity, plant two or more groups of three or five throughout your landscape. It's an easy way to cover a lot of ground and keep things looking neat and tidy.
- No landscape? No problem! Nearly all of our shrubs can readily be grown in containers on balconies, patios, porches, and decks. See page 66 for our guide to growing and caring for shrubs in containers.



Look for drawings of a home, like the one above, for hints on how the plants may be positioned in your landscape for maximum enjoyment.















NEED SPACE? MOVE SOMETHING!

Most shrubs and perennials can easily be transplanted if you want to replace something in your landscape with a new variety, or something better suited to your conditions. The very best time to do this is in early spring, but it is possible to do it during any cool weather. We recommend digging the new hole for the plant being moved as best you can first to minimize the amount of time the plant spends out of the ground. It's best to do this on cloudy days (or even during a light rain), but if it is sunny, cover the rootball with a piece of burlap or an old sheet to protect the delicate roots. Water the plant well after transplanting and keep a close eye on it the rest of the season. It will likely need extra water as it gets re-established in its new home.



WHERE CAN I LEARN MORE ABOUT THE PLANTS?

That's exactly what the chart on page 90 is for. Rather than clutter up the photos with a lot of little details about every plant, we put them in an easy-to-read chart. There, you'll find the plant's hardiness zone (i.e., whether it will survive winter in your area), heat tolerance, size, and how much light it needs (the majority of our shrubs will grow in full sun to part sun). You can also find much more information — and more photos — at provenwinners.com/plants/shrubs.

Specimen plants are those landscape elements that, because of their structure, their color, their sheer flower power, (or maybe all three!), make a dramatic statement that accents your home's architecture.

Specimen shrubs tend to be larger plants (usually 5'/1.5m or taller) that are exceedingly showy at least once a year. Think of them as the plants that set your home apart from everyone else's.

The right specimen plant will make passersby stop in their tracks, but with so many options, how to pick the right one? As you look through the following pages, note which ones you are personally drawn to. Think about where they might be placed in your landscape that will accentuate features of your home's exterior, like spaces between windows, a fireplace, or the center of a large bed. Think, too, of your home's color. Is there a specimen shrub here that would really set it off, either when it is in flower, or perhaps in fall, if it develops outstanding color? The important thing is to select plants that you love and can be proud of year after year.

If you find yourself drawn to more than one plant, you don't have to pick just one! A specimen shrub is a focal point of a portion of your landscape, so there's room for multiple specimens within one yard. For maximum impact, look for plants that are at peak at different times of the year so the focus shifts through the season. And don't forget about the back and sides of your home — specimen plants aren't just for passersby. They can be a key part of your private retreat as well.


















Some people call these foundation plants, because they are traditionally used to cover or soften your house's foundation. Whatever you call them, though, you can count on them to beautify your landscape year-round. These are plants that you can mix and match — colors, shapes, sizes — to fill in the spaces between other landscape elements. Generally speaking, the border plants on these pages are going to be shorter than 5'/1.5m and grow with a naturally appealing shape.

The spaces in your landscape that can be filled by these border plants provide the perfect opportunity to explore your favorite plants (hydrangeas, anyone?!) or to experiment with something new and compelling, like a dwarf birch or tiny pomegranate. You'll find lots of interesting choices on the following pages; as you plan your landscape, be sure to note some eye-catching evergreens: the most successful borders or foundation plantings provide a mix of foliage and flowering plants for a dynamic display every day, no matter what the season.







Hedges are some of the hardest working plants in the garden, fulfilling the important role of providing privacy and enclosure. While this function is of particular importance in areas where neighbors are nearby, hedges have long been implemented in very large spaces to delineate separate areas or create a strong structural statement.

Before we get to the plant listings, let's first dispel a few hedge myths. First, they needn't be evergreen. Though arborvitae (*Thuja sp.*)

is probably the shrub most people think of for hedging, larger panicle hydrangeas like 'Limelight' make a fabulous flowering hedge, as do forsythia and quince. Second, they don't need to be tightly clipped and formal. Some of the nicest hedges are simply left to be themselves, with no fussy pruning or trimming. Third, a hedge doesn't have to be hundreds of feet long — just three or more of the shrubs on the following pages can create a useful, effective hedge, even in an average sized yard.

GROWING CONTAINERS

Gardeners across North America frequently write us to ask if they can grow our shrubs in containers, and we are happy to say that our answer is always an enthusiastic yes. Garden designers have been doing it for centuries, as it's a perfect way to enjoy year-round beauty and structure anywhere you can set a pot. Here are a few simple guidelines to help assure your success.

PLANT SELECTION

Technically speaking, any of our 300+ shrubs can be grown in a container. However, if you are planning to keep the shrub in its container all year round, many recommend selecting a plant that is a zone or two hardier than your actual zone (i.e., if you live in zone 5, look for plants that are hardy to zone 3 or 4). This is a very conservative guideline, as it is perfectly possible to be successful with a shrub that is hardy only to your zone, though it does depend somewhat on the plant itself, the container you've selected, and other climatic conditions, such as snow cover, rain, and duration of winter.

CONTAINER SELECTION

The easiest way to determine the right container to start with is to use the size of the plant that you purchase:

White Proven Winners pot size	Decorative container diameter
1 gallon	10-14"
2 gallon	12-16"
3 gallon	14-18"
5+ gallon	20"+

Look for containers that are proportionally high to wide — you want a good volume of soil for the roots to fill. Plus, too small of a container will make watering a real chore. The container must have plenty of open drainage holes in the bottom so that water will flow freely out instead of backing up in the pot.

IMPORTANT: Clay and ceramic containers may crack or break when exposed to freezing temperatures, which not only destroys the container but may kill the plant as well. If you live in a cold climate, you must select decorative containers made of materials that can stand up to the weather: plastic, resin, fiberglass, wood, or metal.

PLANTING

It may be tempting to fill your container with old plastic bottles or packing peanuts or other such materials. However, we strongly recommend against this: it does nothing to help drainage and actually decreases the volume of soil available for the roots to grow into, which means you'll have to transplant sooner or water more frequently. Instead, fill the entire volume of the container with a good fresh potting mix. There's no need to look for any kind of fancy potting soil, either: anything that's suitable for containers will work for shrubs.

TIP: If you want to prevent soil from washing out the drainage holes, place a small scrap of newspaper or a coffee filter over the holes. This won't hinder drainage and is very effective at retaining soil.

CONTAINER CARE - SPRING-FALL

Because of the relatively small volume of soil around the roots, shrubs in containers can dry out quickly and will need frequent watering. The hotter and sunnier the weather, the more water the plant will need. Plan to water at least once a week in cool conditions and three or more times a week in warm or hot weather. There are a few simple ways to check if your plant needs water — stick a bamboo stake about 8" into the soil and pull it out. If it comes out dry, water is likely necessary. If it comes out muddy or has moist soil crumbs sticking to it, check it again in a day or two. If your pot is not too large or heavy, you can also try lifting it. If it feels very lightweight, water is necessary.

TIP: The high peat content in most potting mixes can cause the soil to pull away from the side of the container, so that when you water, it flows down the sides and out the bottom without actually watering the plant. Direct the water to the soil surface rather than the sides, and when you see water coming out the bottom, don't assume you've watered enough — check the actual soil to see that you have.

CONTAINER CARE - WINTER

Provided the shrub is hardy (i.e., able to survive winter) in your area, it should stay outdoors all year. Bringing cold tolerant plants indoors for winter is tricky at best: the fresh air, fluctuating temperatures, and changing day length outside all serve as seasonal cues for the plant's life cycle. If you wish, you may move the container with the plant to a sheltered area out of the harshest winds.

Just because a plant has gone dormant for winter does not mean its water needs have disappeared. In warm climates, shrubs in containers should be checked for water at least twice a week. In cold areas, once every 10 days or so should be sufficient. If the soil is dry, it's not necessary to water like in the summer, with water coming out the bottom. Simply wetting the top inch or so of soil is enough to stave off potential winter drought stress.

TRANSPLANTING

Provided its needs for space and proper growing conditions are met, your shrub can grow happily in its container for three years or so, maybe even longer. You'll know it's time to transplant out into the landscape or into a larger container when it becomes very difficult to keep watered, wilts frequently, and/or falls over frequently.















Flowers are fabulous, but it's the foliage that really does the heavy lifting of keeping a plant beautiful and interesting beyond that sometimes brief period.

Variegated shrubs — those with leaves of white, yellow, or pink, combined with green — are a no-brainer way to liven up the landscape beyond the bloom time.

Another advantage of variegated shrubs: they are often more shade tolerant than their all-green kin.




HOW TO READ OUR PLANT TAG



Date planted: write in the date you planted your new shrub for future reference.

Shrub care link: Our shrub care center compiles a number of useful articles on caring for your landscape.

Scientific name and patent status



Light exposure: tells if the plant will grow in sun, shade, or in between. Sun is 6+ hours of bright light daily, part sun/part shade is 4-6 hours of sun or filtered light, and shade is fewer than 4 hours.

Hardiness: the coldest winter temperatures the plant can survive.

Size: the height and width the plant will reach after about 7 years in the ground.

Spacing: a recommendation of how far apart to plant multiples of the same shrub.

Bloom Time: when you can expect the plant to bloom. May vary a bit depending on your climate.

Pruning: when to prune. Note that pruning is not always required; consult the plant listing on our website for full details.

Soil & Water: if the plant requires any particular soil conditions, you'll find that here.

Care: fertilizing instructions or other maintenance recommendations.

Uses: suggested landscape roles where this variety may particularly excel.

Deer resistance: indicates level of resistance to deer damage.
